OK, ok, so there's still room for improvement after a narrow 83-0 setback at the hands of perennial power Hot Springs on Friday. But these Eagles have made a mountain of progress since that first day of practice.

"It was kind of a funny thing," head coach Shane Sander recalled. "We started up and within 10 minutes I had three guys throwing up."

"I remember our athletic director came by and he was like, 'Gosh Coach, we can't afford to lose any!' But we were just doing warm-ups, just the prelude to stretching."

Ah, the exuberance of youth. So excited and nervous were these chaps that they couldn't keep from tossing their cookies.

I'd probably be that excited too if I had the chance to play 6-man instead of the traditional 11-man. Imagine, every guy can go out for a pass. No all-time blockers. No 6-3 final scores.

"I like how much flexibility you have," said Sander, who buses his crew all the way to Alberton for home games. "Now I watch 11-man football and it's like, man, there's a lot of wasted

bodies out there."

"It looks so much more complicated. Six -man has a simplicity to it that I like. You can do anything. We've seen all kinds of stuff, like four receivers bunched up against the sideline, hand-off to the guard, just crazy stuff."

Sander, who not only runs the show but helped design the uniforms and order equipment, might've never guessed his team would be 4-1. Not after some of the flaws that were revealed when his team took the field for the first time at West Yellowstone.

"I remember I was helping guys understand just basic stuff like pass coverage and how to tackle," he recalled. "I think we had several tackles in that game where guys would just grab somebody from behind and yank them backwards because that was all they knew to do -- borderline horse collar, but not quite."

Despite a lack of experience, the Eagles have mostly soared by staying cohesive and playing with heart. They're good friends at school, some are close chums on the basketball team and the

camaraderie is palpable.
What a terrific example for every prep team, regardless of the level.

"In three of the first four games there was a point where it would have been easy for them to start yelling at each other, get down on each other, and yet they just hung together," Sander said. "I've never seen any of our guys getting mad at each other. They just keep pushing on together."

Sander, who played 8-man football as a prep in Superior, has enjoyed the low-pressure aspect of Valley Christian's inaugural season. No parents getting up in his grill, plus the fan support has been pretty decent considering the Eagles never play in Missoula.

As Christians we must be vigilant to teach our children from a biblical worldview which maintains that there is absolute truth and that truth is found in


Jesus and his Word. In John 14:6 Jesus states, "I am the way the truth and the life. No one comes to the Farther except through me."
