As we have all been taught in Bible class through these years, it shows in our actions that uprightness is important.





The Principal Perspectives "Remembering the Faithfulness of God"

"Know therefore that the LORD your God is God; he is the faithful God, keeping his covenant of love to a thousand generations of those who love him and keep his commands." Deuteronomy 7:9

In life, there are times when our trust in God is tested. It's during those times that we need to rest on the faithfulness of God. God's faithfulness means that He always does the right thing in every situation. It also means He'll never fail to meet a promise. Although circumstances change, the Lord and His Word remain the same.

Most recently my foundation of trust was shaken.

Back in October, during a routine doctor's visit, some abnormalities were found in my blood work. A month and half later my doctor ordered additional lab work, as well as an ultrasound to check my liver. During the ultrasound, my liver appeared to be healthy, but something showed up on my right kidney. A CAT scan revealed an 8 cm mass growing on my kidney. Surgery was immediately scheduled to remove the mass as well as the right kidney. The surgery was successful and the pathology

report showed that it was Stage 2 cancer. Because of early

detection, the surgeon was able to completely remove the tumor without any signs that the cancer had spread.

Throughout my life, I have learned that nothing happens by chance to the children of God. It has been through the most difficult times of my life that I have clearly seen the faithfulness of God. Prior to

surgery, I was visiting with a close family friend. He commented on how calm I appeared (something that is not within my human nature). At that moment I, too, was surprised that I wasn't feeling anxious. I can only attribute that to the faithfulness of God as well the prayers of so many.

I was once again reminded that God is faithful and true to his promises. That's who he is. What should be done in light of this understanding? Trust him. What does that look like in our day to day lives? It looks like obedience. It means taking him at his word and doing what his

word says. It means persevering in prayer. It means being prepared to speak and interact in ways that are contrary to the world's priorities.

Finally, it means meditating on God's Word: "Because of the Lord's great love we are not consumed, for his compassions never fail. They are new every morning;

great is your faithfulness." Lamentations 3:22-23

Russell wrote as a senior, "I know that if I stay with God everything will be exactly how it should be and this is my only hope." What powerful words to comfort his family in this season of separation: everything is as how God would direct.

Before God called Russell to his eternal home, he had sent an email praising God for securing the site to hold the Friends of Valley Christian 3-on-3 Basketball Tournament fundraiser to be held in May. Russell was at work and at worship to the end of his days.

cutting machine, including multiple cartridges and lots of fun card


stock for making bulletin boards and projects. For more information and a list of all the products with Box Tops labels, go to boxtops4education.com.







Vision Screening

On Wednesday
February 10th, the
Downtown Lions Club
provided VCS with a free
vision screening for all
students. Per the Department of Education, this
screening serves as a
safety net for our students who
might not have regular access to
primary care.

A vision screening also serves to ensure that academic success is not impacted by a missed diagnosis. It is important to detect vision problems early to help ensure normal eyesight development.



This efficient little device measures good vision.

We are very fortunate to have had the opportunity to have The Lions Club help us establish a new annual

service as part of the care we provide our students. They have committed to providing the vision screening equipment each year for this service.

The screening takes approxi-

mately 15 seconds to perform on each student and allows the school nurse to see which students need to be referred for further evaluation. The parameters triggering a referral are set by a local eye doctor. No permanent records of the screening are kept.




The Deep South (as the southern-most building on the VCS campus has been affectionately called) is under construction once again.
