In a Christian school, teachers get to know every one of their students on a personal level. This includes not only in the classroom but on the athletic field, in musical productions, and in ministry activities. And, of course, students and teachers share their faith daily during prayer time and at regular chapel services. Seeing your child in many different lights and getting to know their heart gives their teachers insight that enhances the whole learning process.

An outgrowth of the close teacher/student relationship is trust. Students feel free to discuss ideas and problems with their teachers and coaches—adults who they look up to as trusted mentors.

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
